#### What is Safeguarding Children and Young People?



Every 15 minutes a child is abused in Australia.

The rates of child abuse are increasing every year.

And these are only the <u>number of reported cases</u>.

In 2018, 1,649,178 children participated in an AFL program or competition.

# Safeguarding Children and Young People within the Sporting Community

- The establishment of a national Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse (RC)
- The RC investigated how sporting clubs have responded to allegations and instances of Child Sexual Abuse
- To create a 'safer future for all children'
- Organisations are responsible 'regardless of where or when the abuse took place'



#### Why do we Safeguard Children and Young People?

- Children have the right to relax, play and to join in a wide range of leisure activities
- Every child has the right to feel and be safe
- We have a <u>duty of care</u> to protect children and young people from harm
- All organisations concerned with children should work towards what is best for

each child



#### **Safeguarding Policies**

 A Code of Conduct identifies acceptable and unacceptable behaviours towards children and young people

 A Safeguarding Policy identifies key areas of risk and best practice throughout the organisation




#### Some Areas of High Risk In Sport Include...

# WHO NEEDS A WWCC?



ALL employees and volunteers of sport and recreation clubs and associations where there are "services or activities provided in the course of the operation of clubs and associations with a significant membership of, or involvement by, children", regardless of whether or not they actually work with children or have any contact with children".



A member of SAPOL or AFP

Service is provided on less than 7 occasions

Parents with a child in the activity (this has several exceptions\*)

\* Parent / Guardian exemption does not form part of SANFL WWCC policy for clubs. SANFL policy requires all volunteer parents/ guardians to hold a WWCC.
