THOMMO THE BEST COACH I'VE HAD

It's been a tough initiation into senior SANFL coaching ranks for Central District's Paul Thomas over the past year-and-a-half but Aiden Grace lauds the Bulldogs great as "definitely the best coach I've had across the years".

"I've got a really good relationship with Thommo," Grace said. "Yes, he's tough, but I think that's just because of the success he had as a player. He really drives the standards and is a really good communicator. I've grown pretty close to him."

So, when a minority of fair-weather fans decided to jump on social media and have a shot at Thomas following Central's unsatisfactory 98-point loss to Sturt in Round 6, Grace felt compelled to leap to his coach's defence. "You're all not true supporters," Grace posted on Facebook. "Nothing to do with our coach. We played, we take responsibility for it, it's not acceptable. If you're not willing to support us through this you shouldn't support us. But don't try (to) blame it on one person."

Grace's emotion-charged comment received 74 'likes' from those who appreciated the talented Tassie goalsneak supporting his coach. "Everyone's entitled to their own opinion and I get their frustration after we have a loss like that," Grace said. "All supporters are entitled to their own opinion and I love their passion but they don't see what Thommo does behind the scenes. He's definitely helping us grow as footballers and as people outside of footy. My partner said 'don't comment' and I probably wish I didn't ... but at the same time I have to jump to Thommo's defence because I'm not going to let people speak about our coach like that."

Grace may have been at Central for less than two seasons but his connections with the Bulldog family stretch back much further. Grace was just beginning his senior career and fellow Tasmanian Ian Callinan, a SANFL superstar with Central from 2007-13, at the tail end of his when the pair were teammates at Hobart-based Clarence in the TSL.

Grace also took out Clarence's Rising Star trophy, named after another Tasmanian great who made an enormous impression at Elizabeth, the late Daniel Hulm. "I won the Daniel Hulm Award when I was 17-18, so I know a bit about him," Grace said of the Dogs' 2000 premiership skipper. "Hulmy is obviously a legend of this club who played a big part in driving Central's



standards. I played two years with 'Wingnut' (Callinan) at Clarence and he was the only reason I came over to the SANFL. Because of my relationship with him and his great relationship with Central, he was able to put in a good word for me."

Growing up, Grace was a better cricketer than footballer, representing Tasmania at State under-19 level as a wicketkeeper before switching to the winter code. He's been kicking goals ever since. He led the Geelong Football League's goalscoring in 2018 with St Mary's – while also playing some VFL games for the Cats – before switching to Glenorchy and claiming the 2019 Peter Hudson Medal for most TSL goals.

Grace's expert goalkicking has been one of the shining lights in a difficult couple of years for the Dogs. "It's what I'm here to do, playing with a bit of energy and trying to find the goals," said Grace, who works as a sales rep at Access Express. "You want more wins and to have that success but I've loved every minute here, which is why we're choosing to stay for as long as we can. The club has embraced and looked after me, my partner and our family really well. I couldn't really see us going anywhere anytime soon."

MATCH PREVIEWS

A couple of weeks ago, some SANFL fans were spouting the top five was done and dusted. Reigning premiers the Eagles had ground out a win against South and Sturt had stunned higher-ranked Adelaide and, in fourth and fifth places, they had moved two wins clear of their nearest rivals, the Panthers and Norwood. The fact the Eagles and the Blues were just one win behind second-placed Glenelg surely supported their fans' argument they would be there come finals time.

A fortnight later, the buzz is well-and-truly back about the fight for the five. Who could have written Norwood or South off? Who could have forgotten just how tight the competition is? You didn't have to look any further afield than Woodville Oval last week to see there's no such thing as a certainty in this comp, which is turning up a notch right now. Central District had been feeling the heat after a crushing Round 6 loss against Sturt but the Bulldogs have been building since and forward Aiden Grace came out in strong support of coach Paul Thomas in an interview with Budget reporter Steve Barrett before they faced the Eagles. And how spot on his insights proved as the Doggies played sensational footy in a 35-point win that really threw the Dogs among the Eagles and reminded us all what a ripper – and highly-competitive – league it is we love.

SOUTH V ADELAIDE

You couldn't say the Panthers weren't due a stroke of luck. And on a big day for a club stalwart with a name that's a huge part of South Adelaide folklore, too. The Panthers proved how serious they were about playing finals footy for the third year in a row when they halted North's seven-game winning streak with a heartstopping, gutsy two-point win. No wonder ruckman Keegan Brooksby enjoyed being

cheered from his Noarlunga ground after his 100th game for the club. It's been an unusual path to the milestone, having had stints with Gold Coast, West Coast and Hawthorn and playing fly-in, fly-out footy from Melbourne. Brooksby, whose father Phil and uncle Graham were long-serving stalwarts at South, had 16 touches and 31 hit-outs to play a key role in a crucial win for South, which has been battling a horror run of injuries and narrow losses. Brooksby's likely battle with Adelaide's Kieran Strachan could shape a clash that will have a big say in the shaping of the top five. The Crows big man was again dominant in a fighting come-from-behind win against West, racking up 20 disposals, 13 marks, 34 hit-outs and two goals. It took rev-ups at the first two breaks from coach Michael Godden before the Crows kicked clear of West but it seems unlikely they will have to be told before this game just how big is their clash with the Panthers.

WEST V EAGLES

The Bloods are getting closer – and so are the Eagles. West is closing in on that long-awaited first win for the season, having led third-ranked Adelaide by 16 points

at half-time last week. And, although there's certainly no need to panic yet, back-to-back premiers the Eagles are getting closer to the unthinkable – being tipped out of the top five, just a win ahead of Norwood and South after their shock loss to Central. Westies had some more positives last week as Jackson Edwards put his best foot forward with 22 kicks, 10 marks and eight clearances, while Joel Stevens was named SANFL's Powerade Breakthrough Player after his impressive performance. But the Bloods will need to be at it for the full four quarters and make the most of all their chances to beat the Eagles, who have way too much class to put in another below-par performance. Dylan Clarke continued his outstanding season in amassing 32 disposals and 11 clearances while booting one of just five Eagles goals for a forgettable day.

CENTRAL V NORTH

There's been a lot asked of Fraser Fort for a long time – up forward, down back, pinch-hitting in ruck. He's an under-rated force of nature who always throws himself into whatever is best for the team, most often against overwhelming odds. But Fort got the result he deserved

when the Bulldogs gained a thoroughly-deserved win against the Eagles, the unfashionable tall basically doing it all in racking up 24 disposals, six marks, eight tackles, eight hit-outs, seven clearances and kicking a game-high 2.2. Travis Schiller deserved a win, too, after seven successive Dogs losses, his 34 touches and seven clearances continually sparking his side into action. And Justin Hoskin has shown in his return from injury in the past two weeks just how costly was his six-week absence – he continually set up his side from defence with 27 kicks and outstanding composure. The Dogs' pressure was stunning as they out-tackled the Eagles 83-53 while actually having more of the footy. A game against top side North that a few weeks ago might have looked like a mismatch now looms as a ripper. The Roosters were brought back to earth in their two-point loss to South but there's no doubt a side that's claimed more than its fair share of fighting wins this season will be fighting for all it is worth again this week.

PORT V GLENELG

Just get through the first two minutes in one piece, then enjoy it. This may have seemed an unusual goal for Darcy Bailey's 100th game but the Tigers' premiership star had seen these celebrations go drastically wrong for a couple of team-mates. Luke Reynolds reached his 100-game milestone this year on Good Friday but it quickly turned into a bad Friday. The straight-shooting left-footer suffered a fractured jaw in the first 30 seconds against Adelaide and he didn't play again until Round 7. And another premiership team-mate, Brad Agnew, was concussed in the opening minute of his 100th game in 2017, against the Eagles, also at the Bay, when he slammed into a goalpost. So when the first few minutes were done and dusted against Sturt and Bailey was still in the thick of it, he started to enjoy himself. It's hardly surprising he did, considering he picked up a game-high 35 touches, setting up countless Tiger attacks from his new role this season as an outstanding ball user from half-back. And Bailey wasn't the only

one delighted after the Tigers' stunning 67-point win, coach Brett Hand rightfully satisfied with the best four-quarter performance his men had put together in his time at the club.

His men will know they need to do it all again against Port Adelaide, which has beaten the Tigers in their past two meetings. The Magpies were right up to their eyeballs in it against Norwood with Sam Mayes' work ethic and desperation earning him a staggering 11 clearances as he fired out 21 handballs. Port attacked the contest with ferocity and won the inside-50 count 53-45 but was caught short by its inability to finish off its work. The exception to the rule was former Redleg Anthony Wilson, who had just five kicks but booted three goals.

NORWOOD V STURT

It's a huge clash with the winner guaranteed the immediate reward of sitting above their old rival in the top five. Sturt won their most recent clash by a comfortable 28 points at Unley in Round 5 but a lot has happened since then and the Redlegs must start favourites this time. They have been building nicely and there are a couple of stats that point to the Blues facing a torrid time at The Parade. Norwood heads the SANFL with most clearances (with an average of 38.5 – Sturt is fourth at 34) and most tackles (average 88, while Sturt is ninth on 55). And Tom Lewis, who tallied six clearances and six tackles in the Blues' Round 5 win, remains on the sidelines after suffering a ruptured spleen. And back in Round 5, the Legs were without Matt Panos. Coach Jade Rawlings has sure come to realise how much he was missed last year after a knee reconstruction. He may be 31 now and maybe he's slowed down a tad but his four goals against Adelaide and three against Port show he's still a matchwinner. This match is a big one to win.

MASTER COACHES WOULD BE JUST AS GOOD TODAY

Football has changed a lot since the SANFL's halcyon days of the 1950s to the '80s.

One of the biggest changes has been the evolution of the art of coaching – from tactics, to people management, to technology, to volume of support staff.

The SANFL has been blessed throughout its long history to boast some of the sport's most magnificent coaching minds. Would those premier master coaches of the past – with the aid of a fictional time machine – adapt to the vastly different modern league coaching caper of 2022?

In the case of the very best ones, led by legendary 10-time premiership-winning mentor Jack Oatey, the answer is a resounding "yes".

Oatey changed the face of Australian football with his development of attacking, run-on handball and strong emphasis on skills.

"Jack was a natural leader who understood the psyche of different players and was like a father figure to us," said star Sturt defender Sandy Nelson, who for his entire 12-season playing career was coached by Oatey. "Jack would be like Alastair Clarkson if he coached

today. He was years ahead of his time.

"He was always innovative ... we spent countless hours refining our skills. Jack felt skill would beat brawn, which was the common style at the time. He was a great thinker of the game."

Full back Andrew Downes, an 18-year-old member of the Double Blues' 1978 grand final side who carved a solid 12-year career of his own, agreed. "Jack was an amazing communicator and would adapt to today's environment," Downes said. "Even in those days he was starting to utilise third-party expertise, which historically hadn't been part of the process. By the late '70s, he was introducing specialised training people. The style of football Sturt played set a new standard."

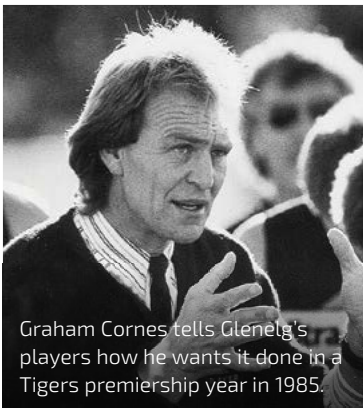
Oatey's chief coaching rival was Fos Williams, the legendary nine-time Port Adelaide flag winner. While it has often been suggested Williams' roaring coaching style favoured brawn over brain – particularly when compared to Oatey – brilliant Magpies rover Brian Cunningham believes his inaugural league mentor is sometimes undersold.

"When people see the old videos of Fos shouting, yelling and raving,

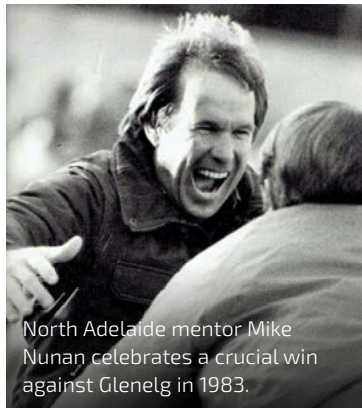
they don't realise that behind all that was a lot of innovation and strategy," said Cunningham, who played 256 games for Port from 1971-83. "It's amazing the amount of time and effort he put into individual coaching of players. Fos was one of the best rovers in Australia as a player – he typed up a two-page document of all the things a rover should be thinking about in the game and gave it to me when I was 18. I read it before every game and gave a copy to Tim Ginever, Paul Belton and the other rovers who followed me. Apart from being instructional, it was quite motivational. The moral of the story is, as much as Fos might be described as an old coach in the way he was really strong-voiced, there was a lot of science behind what he did."

Cunningham's mid-career peak came under the tutelage of his second league mentor, John Cahill, whose upbeat brand of motivation helped the Magpies to 10 flags.

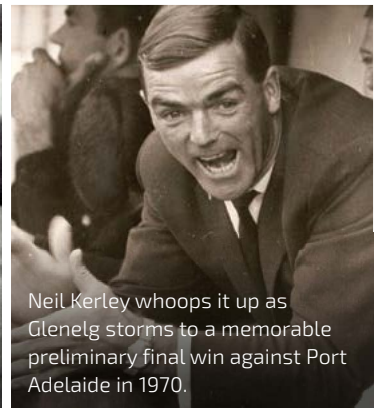
"John took the best of what Fos had and added to it," said Cunningham, Port's captain for the 1979-81 premiership threepeat under coach Cahill. "He more understood what the modern game needed. John wasn't as volatile as

Fos but he could deliver and motivate with his pre-match and half-time talks. John had an ability in one-on-one situations to make any player believe he was the best he could be. There was less strategy for John, but more about getting the best out of people."

Former West Adelaide skipper Leon Grosser was the only player to be coached at league level by Williams, Cahill and the always-raising, inspirational, four-time SANFL premiership-winning legend Neil Kerley.

"I only had Fos for a year (1978) but I remember he was very hard-nosed and all about putting your body on the line at every opportunity," recalled Grosser, who played 280 matches for the Bloods across 16 seasons. "I only played five games under Fos, so I wasn't fortunate enough to receive one of those famous sprays. Kerls was very scary, very intimidating but very honest and straight down the line. He was very animated and sensational at psyching people up and bringing everyone together. Kerls scared me more (than Cahill). Jack was always very positive, never anything negative."

Grosser has no doubt all three would have made the coaching transition to the current era. "Game plans have changed a lot but I think they were all smart enough men to be able to adapt," he said. "No matter what era you're coaching in, you change it up and modify to the new methods. They would have been able to adapt, for sure."

Colourful North Adelaide, Norwood and Adelaide centremen Andrew Jarman spent the first 165

games of his stellar career being coached by Michael Nunan.

Highly regarded for his sophisticated football mind and pedigree in sports science, Nunan steered the Roosters to flags in 1987 and '91 and left an indelible impression on Jarman. "I believe I played under the best coach ever in Michael Nunan," Jarman said. "We were up for a long time and the style of footy we played was high-octane, running, skilful footy. He was a father figure and the way he coached and developed us, he was a great mentor and ahead of his time as a senior coach."

Darel Hart, a long-time teammate of Jarman's at North and Adelaide, believes Nunan the coach would have flourished today. "Whether he was ahead of his time or thinking of different things before someone else, I'm not sure, but Nunan was a very good coach," said Hart, who played 175 games under Nunan for the Roosters before assuming the reins as captain-coach in 1993-94. "Having coached myself without a lot of success, I have a lot of respect for any coach who has a good deal of success. Anybody who coaches a premiership would be able to adapt and change to the way the game is played presently. Obviously I'm biased because Nunan coached me for a very long time but I think he would be able to coach in the modern era without a drama."

Nunan's mid-80s coaching rival Graham Cornes emerged from the Kerley stable and boasted bucketloads of charisma, inventiveness and nous which helped steer Glenelg to those

famous back-to-back pennants in 1985-86.

"I don't think Graham was ahead of his time but he was perfect for that time," said Chris McDermott, arguably coach Cornes' most fearless and loyal disciple at the SANFL Tigers and AFL Crows. "We needed somebody like him who had very clear guidelines, strong disciplines and a real faith in his game style."

The teetotalling Cornes may have been unsuccessful in his endeavours to outlaw alcohol consumption among those rock-and-roll Tigers of the 1980s but he didn't let that affect the Bays' glittering on-field performances nor his off-field rapport with his players.

"Graham tried to put in booze bans at Glenelg and we just ignored them," laughed McDermott, who was coached by Cornes for 10 straight years, at the Tigers from 1985-90 and the Crows from 1991-94, the last seven seasons as skipper. "He's a non-drinker and had to deal with us lot, who played hard on and off the field. We weren't easy to handle but we had enormous respect and admiration for him. We would have done anything for him ... except behave off the field! His record speaks for itself."

McDermott has no doubt whatsoever Cornes, particularly that '80s Glenelg version, would have thrived as a coach in 2022. "He could evolve a game plan and learn the new ways," McDermott said. "I don't think the game changing would be a problem for him. I think the Graham Cornes from 1985-90 would be magnificent today."

TORRENS UNIVERSITY U18 WRAP

A blistering second-term blitz ensured North Adelaide would remain at the top of the U18 Torrens University Cup table with a 74-point win against fast-starting South Adelaide at Prospect Oval.

Restricted to just one goal in the first term, the Roosters went from trailing by 19 points at the first change to leading by 24 at half-time on the back of booting 7.2 to the Panthers' 0.1. James White (28 disposals, nine clearances), Oliver Dignan (18 disposals, four goals) and Hugh Wissman (23 disposals, two goals) inspired North's charge. South's Angus Bradley was a strong performer with 30 possessions while Shade Evans made an early impact with two goals in the first quarter.

Woodville-West Torrens snared its third win of the season when it overwhelmed Central District by 53 points at Maughan Thiem Kia Oval.

The Eagles earned the win with a strong tackle count of 75 despite having more of the ball. Patrick Weckert (17 disposals, two goals) earned high praise from his

coaches while Oscar Pearce and Jedd Thomson (27 disposals) also had a strong influence for the Eagles. Ultra-consistent Austin McDonald again led the way for the Bulldogs with a match-high 35 disposals, together with nine clearances and seven tackles, while Nash Haynes had 21 disposals.

Glenelg's Jayden Davis was the hero with a goal on the siren sealing a dramatic three-point win against brave Sturt at Wigan Oval.

The Bays led all match until Sturt's Luca Slade edged the Blues in front by three points with less than 90 seconds on the clock. But a centre-square clearance for the Tigers resulted in a free kick for Davis, who slotted his 35m set shot from directly in front as the final siren sounded. Hayden Brokensha (23 disposals) was selected as the Bays' best player while Slade, son of Central premiership rover Matthew Slade, was among the Blues' best with 21 disposals and two goals.

Norwood tipped West Adelaide out of the top four with an



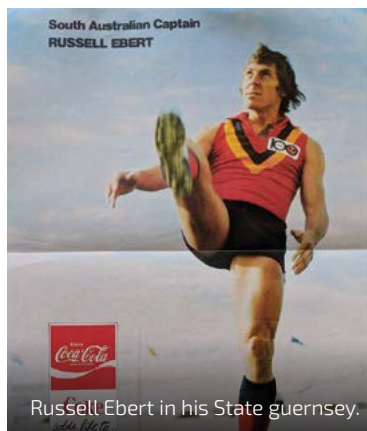
South Adelaide's Shade Evans snaps one of his two goals against North. Photo: Peter Argent.

impressive 56-point win at The Parade.

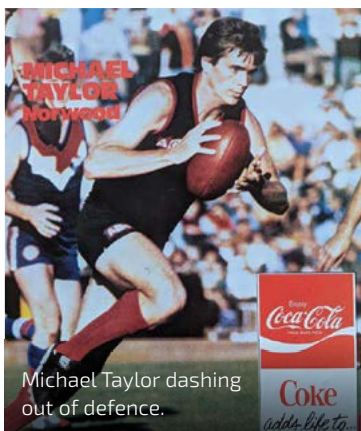

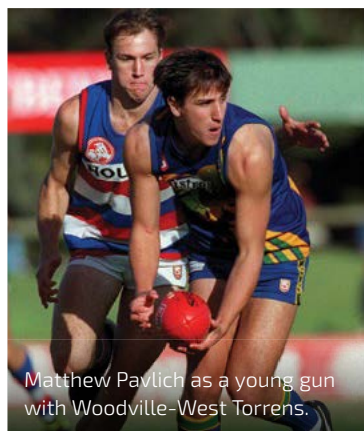

SANFL is celebrating Australian Football Hall of Fame honours for three SA greats – the late Russell Ebert, Michael Taylor and Matthew Pavlich.

Ebert's elevation to Legend status and Taylor and Pavlich's entry into the Hall of Fame were announced on Tuesday 14 June in Melbourne. SA Football Commission chairman Rob Kerin said: "Russell is revered nationally as being among the best all-time players of our game, so it is only fitting he has now been recognised on the national stage in this way." Ebert became the fourth South Australian to be bestowed the game's highest honour, alongside 10-time premiership coach Jack Oatey and Magarey Medallists Barrie Robran and Malcolm Blight. Ebert, the only footballer to have won four

Magarey Medals, played 392 games for Port, won six best-and-fairest awards and three premierships.

For fans who would like to reminisce about this icon of SA sport and the remarkable era in which he played, the SANFL History Centre's *Our Footy, Our People, Our Stories* exhibition at the State Library is a must see. The exhibition, which kicked off to resounding acclaim on June 3 and runs until October 16, celebrates the 145th anniversary of organised football in SA and fittingly pays tribute to Ebert, who died of leukaemia in November last year. A striking photo of Ebert in the famous red State jumper – he played 29 games for SA – is the centrepiece of a huge visual display at the exhibition.

Taylor is one of the greatest

players to represent Norwood, a highly-consistent back pocket or midfielder in 289 SANFL games. His name adorns the Redlegs' club champion award, a fitting tribute considering he won six in his illustrious career. A Norwood FC Hall of Fame Legend, Taylor played with distinction in 94 VFL games for Collingwood.

Fremantle's most decorated footballer, Pavlich, the son of West Torrens star Steve Pavlich, played 353 games for the Dockers, was captain from 2007-15, won the Doig Medal as best-and-fairest a record six times and was leading goalkicker in eight seasons.
