MEDAL MAGIC IN DOGS HOUSE

It was one of those stellar 'one-off' days in Central District's storied history. The Bulldogs' six league Magarey Medallists together.

Two years in the planning due to Covid, Gary Window (1965), John Duckworth (1979), John Platten (1984), Gilbert McAdam (1989), Paul Thomas (2004) and Brad Symes (2012) revived wonderful memories for a packed house of Doggies supporters on Friday, August 5 at Grand Central.

McAdam revealed his decision to move from the NT to the Ponderosa and be coached by Neil 'Knuckles' Kerley, was because he believed it was his last chance to make it in big football and he regarded the recently-passed Kerley as a strong "father figure".

The lunch's MC, Mark Soderstrom, confirmed in discussions with Kerley's widow, Barb, and daughter, Gail, during preparations for his State funeral that, along with SA Football Hall of Famer, West Torrens' Kevin McSporran, McAdam was one of Kerley's only two 'pets' in four decades as a coach.

"It was a great day for the footy club," said Platten, who is one of only three players to have won the Magarey Medal-Brownlow Medal double, in illustrious company with Malcolm Blight and Nathan Buckley. "It was a full house, with icons of the club and special people from our rich history. There were many experiences relived, stories

told and people with a strong connection to the Bulldogs catching up again."

Platten, still heavily involved at the club in a coaching capacity and with the history committee, said the one achievement that would have completed his footy resume was a Central league premiership.

The last word was left to the club's first Magarey Medallist, the extraverted Window, who delivered a motivational speech to complete formal proceedings that would have left any team ready to run through 'brick walls' to get the win.

MATCH PREVIEWS

NORWOOD V GLENELG

What a start to a bumper weekend of crucial SANFL clashes, with a Friday night showdown between the third-placed Redlegs and fourth-ranked Tigers under lights at The Parade. The finals double-chance is squarely on the line, with only percentage separating these rivals with two games to play. It's tight at the top, with North (12-4) just one win ahead of Adelaide, Norwood and Glenelg. While they are locked together on 11 wins and five losses, the form lines of the Legs and Bays contrast starkly. Norwood is the form team of the competition, having strung together seven successive wins. Glenelg, on the other hand, has won just two of its past five, suffering heavy defeats at the hands of Adelaide, South and North. Being beaten by as many as 51 points by the Roosters in a battle for top spot at the Bay was a surprise, especially after their clash at Prospect earlier in the season pretty much came down to the last kick of the day. It's hard to imagine the Tigers won't be throwing themselves into such a big game this week against a side that has become so adept at winning

tight, physical tussles. Nik Rokahr celebrated his 50th game with another outstanding performance in the Legs' heart-stopper against Central. He is averaging 29 disposals a game, with a staggering 95 per cent efficiency. Putting the brakes on Rokahr and his great mate Harry Boyd would go a long way to Glenelg turning its form line around.

NORTH V WEST

When you have a midfield stacked with three players who are in the top seven leading possession-winners in the league, you are bound to be right up there. Harrison Wigg is averaging 30 touches per game, Aaron Young 28 and Campbell Combe 26 and they have played a huge role in North being on track for the minor premiership. The Roosters' midfield isn't all they have going for them, because they are ranked No. 2 for both their scoring power (behind Adelaide) and their stingy defence (behind Norwood), averaging 91 points per game while conceding just 65. That would have all seemed way too much for Westies earlier in the season. But one of the highlights of the comp over the past month has

been the huge steps forward West Adelaide has been taking, breaking through for wins against Port and South and pushing Glenelg all the way to the final siren. The Bloods look so much better with Hamish Hartlett, Jono Beech and Josh Ryan back from what's been a testing injury list and they are simply refusing to concede defeat these days. Trailing 5.5 to 8.13 five minutes into the last quarter against the Panthers, it could so easily have been game over – and you feel like it would have been most times for West over the past few years. But they kept kicking on, booting the last five goals with Nick Steele completing The Big Steal with a long goal on the run at the 23-minute-mark of the last quarter. Brave, bold and belief were words proud coach Brad Gotch used after his side's remarkable win and they could not have been more justified. It may be top against bottom this week but North will be prepared for a tough test.

CENTRAL V ADELAIDE

There's no doubt players from both sides will be looking forward to showing off their skills on Adelaide

Oval. The Crows have plenty of incentive to perform on their AFL club's home ground after the Adelaide-North Melbourne clash. There will be more than a few AFL bosses watching their progress but there's also the prospect of plenty of finals footy to come at the same ground. Win against the Bulldogs and a finals double-chance will pretty much be guaranteed. The Crows jumped into second spot by sweeping reigning premiers the Eagles aside, Matt Crouch picking up another 42 touches and Lachlan Sholl and Matthew Wright – in his 50th game as Adelaide skipper – in the thick of it.

The Dogs have made great progress over the season but now just want to finish off. They suffered their second defeat by less than a kick in the past three games when they couldn't quite overhaul in-form Norwood. The most notable thing about Central's work over the past couple of months has been its refusal to concede. Despite the Redlegs edging three goals clear in the last quarter, the Doggies kept coming, with goals to Kyle Presbury and Aiden Grace giving them a real sniff. Fraser Fort and Isaiah Dudley

missed set shots before some frantic Redlegs defending forced through two rushed behinds but the siren blast was a stake through the heart for the Dogs, who still had the ball in their forward 50. "To score 2.6 in the last quarter is disappointing but I'm proud of our guys to hang in there and embrace the challenge against a strong opponent," coach Paul Thomas said. What better venue to turn a half-chance into a win than the hallowed turf of Adelaide Oval.

EAGLES V STURT

What a sight it was to see gutsy Double Blues midfielder Tom Lewis flexing his muscles after kicking an early goal in his long-awaited return to Unley last week. Lewis was back from a ruptured spleen suffered in Round 6. It says plenty about Lewis's single-minded determination that he played out that game, a big win against Central, then went to work on the following Monday. He admitted the first month was "pretty hard" and he lost six kilos but he could hardly have looked in better nick against the Magpies and there were no half measures, he was straight back into

it. When he goaled at the 14-minute-mark of the opening quarter – one of the first nine goals of the game the Blues kicked – he was mobbed by team-mates and cheered by the Sturt faithful, a ripper 'welcome home' after missing three months of footy. Lewis told Sturt's roving social media interviewer Phil Halliwell he was "stoked to be back out there ... getting my hands on the footy again". With superstar midfielder Patrick Wilson (shoulder) sidelined, Lewis's return is massive as Sturt pushes for its first finals appearance in three seasons. The Blues will know the equation – beat the Eagles and they will definitely play finals. But, equally, the Eagles won't need reminding they have to win or their dream of a historic premiership hat-trick is over. They couldn't match it with the Crows in the second half last week in a third successive loss but there still is plenty of talent in their line-up, Riley Knight leading the way as SANFL's top possession-winner with 462 – he's averaging a whopping 31 per game. Write them off at your own peril.

SOUTH V PORT

It's all about salvaging something out of the season for these clubs now the Panthers are officially out of the finals race. After last week's results, South will be desperate to finish the game off and Port will be looking for a strong start. The Panthers for the third time in their past five games led in time-on of the final quarter only to slip to defeat and because of that they will miss finals for the first time in three years. Port slipped to a 57-point deficit just before half-time as it conceded the first nine goals of the game against Sturt at Unley. But the Magpies showed plenty of fight to kick seven of the last 11 goals of the game. Both sides will be looking for consistent, four-quarter efforts here. And a strong finish to a season that hasn't gone to plan.

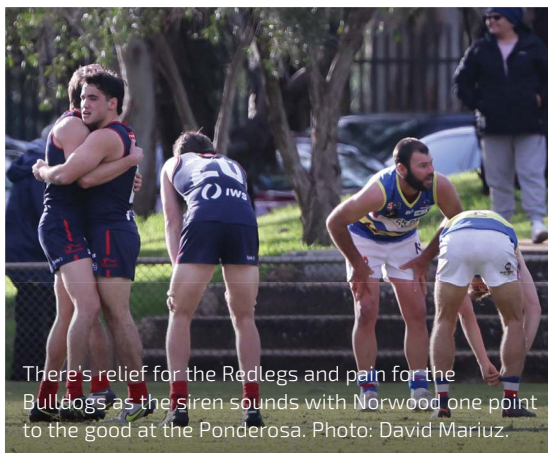

SO NEAR, YET SO FAR

One of the wonderful traditions of Australian football that thankfully hasn't gone down the path of American sport – that happens way too often these days – is the nerve-wracking wait for the final siren.

The clock counting up, not down, makes for superb theatre, for ripping suspense.

And there's been plenty of it this year in a remarkably even SANFL competition. There have been 16 games decided by six points or less, meaning the result has been right up in the air until the timekeeper finally pushes the button and the siren ends the pain – either gloriously, or in shattering despair. In the past three rounds five games have ended this way.

If you're a South Adelaide fan, you're feeling the pain the most. Six of the Panthers' past eight games have been decided by a goal or less. Unfortunately, as coach Jarrad Wright would know too well, four of them have ended in defeat, including to the Eagles and Central by one lousy point.

What makes it all the harder to swallow for South fans is their side was leading in time-on of the last quarter in each of its past three narrow losses, only to see crucial wins slip through their fingers. And losing the close ones can be pretty costly. The Panthers are three wins out of the top five, their finals hopes in tatters.

Central has been making ground this year under Paul Thomas but the premiership table doesn't necessarily

reflect it – the Doggies have lost twice in the past three games by less than a kick, to Sturt and, on Saturday, to Norwood, by the smallest possible margin. It has only won one of its four games to be decided by less than a goal – to South, naturally, by one point.

They say you learn more from losses than wins. And this seems to be the case with Norwood. After losing games by 15 points, two points and six points in the first six rounds, the Legs clearly have progressed from what coach Jade Rawlings described as an "almost team" to one that holds its nerve in the moments that really counts as the clock ticks up to the final siren. Norwood has since its shaky start beaten the Crows by five points and 12 points, South by three points and their latest desperate one-point win at Elizabeth.

In the modern era of defend-at-all-costs football, the lower scores overall mean there are more likely to be closer scorelines. And there's no doubt there's some luck involved in the close ones – the game can swing because of the bounce of a ball or an umpiring call.

This year's records show how even the close finishes are – only Central has more than a one game difference between its wins and losses in games decided by a goal or less.

Wins-losses in the close ones (six points or less):
South 4-4, Norwood 3-2, Glenelg 2-2, Central 1-3, Eagles 2-1, Sturt 1-1, West 1-1, North 1-1, Port 1-0, Adelaide 0-1.

HITTING THE HEIGHTS

There's not much Harry Boyd can't do on a footy field.

Primarily a VFL key defender in his Werribee days before starting his SANFL career with Norwood at centre half-forward, Boyd progressed to the club's No. 1 ruckman, a role he mixes with the odd midfield spell against opponents a fraction his size.

No, that last part is not a misprint.

The 198cm, 108kg Boyd not only periodically roved to his usual understudy Luke Surman in the Redlegs' Round 16 win over Adelaide, he did so directly opposed to 173cm, 73kg James Rowe. It wasn't the only time Boyd has attended a ball-up with the intention of staying low and sharking Surman's taps.

"Me standing next to him (Rowe) amused some onlookers," Boyd said. "I got a weird look from (Crows opponent) Brett Turner but we had a pretty good game in clearances.

"I've been to about 10 centre bounces as a genuine midfielder. We're keen to get a big body in there. I pride myself on being able to play as a clearance-winning midfielder. It doesn't worry me if I line up at full back, full forward, midfield or ruck."

Considered a smokey to become the first ruckman to win the Magarey Medal since Ryan O'Connor in 2001, Boyd not only leads the SANFL in hit-outs, he ranks equal second with North Adelaide on-baller Campbell Combe in clearances, narrowly trailing only Glenelg's Matthew Snook. That elite, unique centre-square skillset makes Boyd, arguably, finals-bound Norwood's most versatile and valuable commodity.

Redlegs fans, riding their red-hot side's seven-game winning streak, can thank close friend Nik Rokahr for the big fella's presence at The Parade. Originally team-mates at their home town of Shepparton, Rokahr invited Boyd to join him at Norwood via Facebook messenger.

"Nik originally asked me to play in Darwin but I wasn't too keen on



that, plus I'd hurt myself while training for a marathon during (Victoria's 2020) lockdown," said Boyd, who shares a house three streets from The Parade with team-mates Rokahr, Nick Lowden and Cory Stockdale. "We then discussed Adelaide ... I was really excited for a change. Because we've played a lot of footy together, there's no doubt there's synergy between me and Nik, but I think that's now growing across the group. We believe in our game style and the way we play. We know it stacks up. There's definitely no cap on how far we can go this season."

After seven steady games to start his Norwood stint in 2021, Boyd was thrust into the lead ruck role when the incumbent, Michael Knoll, missed six weeks with a knee injury.

Boyd thrived, instantly, and again flourished with a superb solo display in Knoll's absence in the Legs' first semi-final loss to South Adelaide.

"When I arrived here, 'Twig' (coach Jade Rawlings) was pretty keen to play me as a forward with some ruck minutes," Boyd said. "I got the chance to take the No. 1 role for parts through the back of the year and I grew in confidence."

The retirement of Knoll because of his knee issues at the end of the season might have been expected to cause concern at The Parade – but not with Boyd in the wings. "I knew I was going to be our No. 1 ruck this year – it's been exciting," said Boyd, who stepped up again to the point he was selected to lead SA's rucks in the Croweaters' State victory over WA in May. "That was a great honour," said Boyd, who works as a personal trainer and is in the second year of a physiotherapy degree at Adelaide University. "Just training with those blokes and them knowing my name was enough of an honour but to play and win in Perth with those guys, I was pinching myself."

TORRENS UNIVERSITY U18 WRAP

West Adelaide kept its Under-18 Torrens University Cup finals hopes alive with an impressive 65-point win against South Adelaide at Flinders University Stadium.

The Bloods led at every change as they gained valuable percentage while keeping the Panthers scoreless in the final term, keeping the pressure on fourth-placed Sturt. Returning West midfielder Kobe Ryan was sensational with 37 disposals, 10 clearances, eight tackles and two goals, while Jamie Kovacic (23 disposals, four goals) and Charlie Haysman (25 disposals) also starred. South trio Cameron Kirkland (14 disposals, one goal), Jye Bottroff and Austin Hogg (16 disposals) were praised for their efforts.

Sturt retained its place in the top four with a commanding 84-point win against Woodville-West Torrens at Maughan Thiem Kia Oval.

Making a statement from the first bounce, the Blues kicked 7.5 in the opening quarter while keeping the Eagles scoreless. Sturt cruised to victory, thanks largely to six-goal spearhead Chad Reschke, Cormac Dwyer (37 disposals, two goals) and Nick Sadler (29 disposals). Bailey

Arthur did his best to stem the tide for the Eagles with 29 disposals and 10 marks, while Callum Fairall (22 disposals) and Hunter Carter (12 disposals, two goals) also held their heads high.

Central District big man Liam Fawcett was the hero with a goal on the final siren edging the Bulldogs four points in front of Norwood at The Parade.

After taking a contested intercept mark at half-forward, Fawcett then received a 25m penalty after a Norwood opponent encroached on the mark. Fawcett (18 disposals, three goals) then calmly slotted his 40m set shot with just 10 seconds to play as team-mates Austin McDonald (32 disposals, 11 clearances) and Nash Haynes (21 disposals) were among those to celebrate. Norwood, still sitting third on the ladder, was best served by Riley Verrall (28 disposals) and Taj Rahui.

North Adelaide has all but clinched the Under-18 Torrens University Cup minor premiership after accounting for Glenelg by 35 points at Prospect Oval.

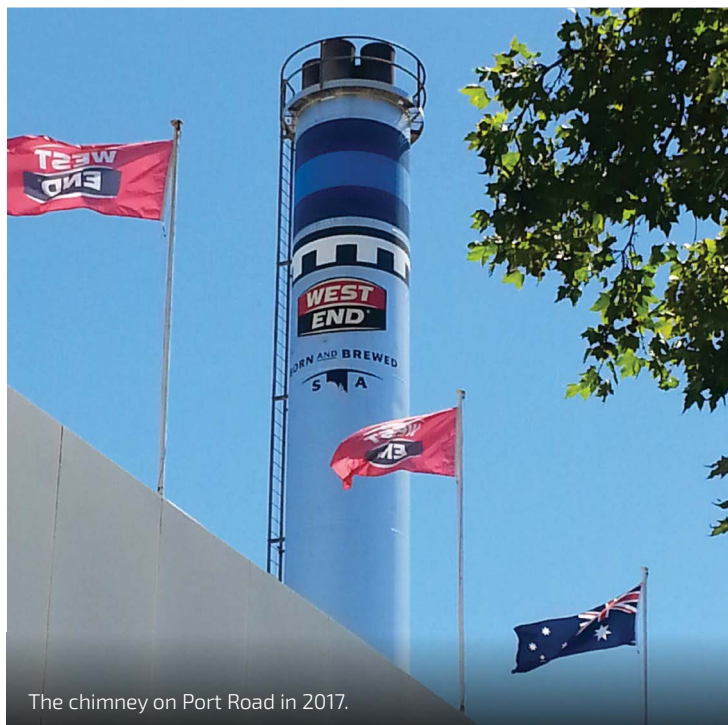

Our Footy, Our People, Our Stories, 145 Years of the SANFL, is an exhibition that is winning the crowds over at the State Library. And one of the highlights of a must visit for footy fans is a stunning 60-page souvenir booklet that captures the essence of the sport's remarkable history. Here is an excerpt, on one of the many things we love about our football.

The West End SANFL chimney ceremony, one of Adelaide's greatest footy traditions, was started by a brewery worker with a loud mouth.

It kicked off in 1954 when the chimney was at SA Brewery on Hindley Street and an employee argued the chimney should be painted red and black because it was in West Adelaide territory. The head of SA Brewing, Sir Roland Jacobs, agreed – but only if the Blood and Tars beat Port Adelaide in the upcoming SANFL grand final.

Maggies coach Fos Williams heard about the deal and demanded Port's black-and-white colours be splashed on the chimney if the flag headed to Alberton. Williams'

Maggies won, grinding out a nail-biting three-point victory at Adelaide Oval. On the following Monday, Williams turned up at the Brewery to stir the paint and watch the chimney be lathered in black and white.

In a tradition that has remained every year since, he argued for West's colours to be on the chimney as well in recognition of its courageous fight. And so started the SANFL chimney ceremony, an Adelaide ritual that has taken place over the past 67 years.

In 1982, when SA Brewing Company moved from Hindley St to its new home at the Southwark Brewery Port Road site, the chimney ceremony went with it. The fact a premiership winning team's colours were on permanent display, rain or shine, and could be seen from kilometres away, has made the chimney tradition one of a kind. It's one thing to win a trophy but it's another thing to drive past a reminder every day that your team won, or lost, the grand final.

When West End announced in 2020 it would be closing its Port

Road brewery and brewing elsewhere, SANFL fans feared time may be up for the much-loved chimney ceremony. The partnership between the SANFL and West End had endured for nearly seven decades since 1954, with West End the major sponsor of the state's top-tier competition. Given the prominent role West End was keen to play with the SANFL for years to come, this was a tradition that was worth fighting for.

The majestic Hoffman Kiln, which stands at the Brickworks Marketplace towers in Thebarton, was considered suitable and its owners, West Torrens City Council, were supportive. Given the heritage status of the kiln, constructed in 1913, detailed plans needed to be drawn up to ensure it would not be damaged. Painting the structure was out of the question. So now the premier's colours are unveiled on a fibreglass shell attached to the top of the kiln. The project came together just in time for the colours of 2021 premier Woodville-West Torrens to be hoisted high.
