

inor premier North
Adelaide set the pace with
six players and coach Jacob
Surjan named in the *The Advertiser*SANFL Team of the Year.

The Roosters remarkably supplied the entire centreline, with Harrison Wigg on a wing, Campbell Combe in the middle and his brother Will on the other wing. Big possession-winner Aaron Young was named at half-forward, next to Keenan Ramsey, selected at centre half-forward after booting 35 goals in the minor round. Roosters vice-captain Cameron Craig was recognised as a vital cog in defence by being named at full back.

Surjan, now in his third season as senior coach at Prospect, revitalised the Roosters for a premiership assault after they crashed out in last year's elimination final. Now in a second grand final in three seasons, Surjan in July had his contract extended until the end of 2025.

Adelaide skipper Matthew Wright created history by becoming the first Crows SANFL player to be named captain of the Team of the

Year. Wright, 32, was handed the honour by the selection panel of SANFL's Matthew Duldig, Sean Toohey, Zac Milbank and Daniel Joyce, The Advertiser's Andrew Capel, Football Budget editor Peter Cornwall and Channel 7's Mark Soderstrom and John Casey.

Named in the forward pocket, Wright booted 28 goals in the minor round before adding an impressive five-goal haul against Norwood in the qualifying final.

Adelaide also had ruckman Kieran Strachan selected on the interchange, as back-up to Norwood big-man Harry Boyd, who was picked as first ruck. Boyd, who has racked up 721 hit-outs this season, was one of three Redlegs chosen along with fellow Shepparton recruit Nik Rokahr (rover) and emerging defender Jack Heard (centre half-back).

Fellow finalists Glenelg – Lachie Hosie (forward pocket), Matthew Snook (half-forward flank), Darcy Bailey (interchange) – and Sturt – James Battersby (interchange), Casey Voss (half-back flank) and Guy Page (back pocket) – also had three players listed in the final 22.


Ken Farmer Medallist Daniel Menzel was a natural fit at full forward, having kicked 51 goals in the minor round, as he joined fellow Eagle Riley Knight (ruck-rover), who averaged a stunning 29.3 disposals a game.

Central District's ultra-consistent Travis Schiller was named to form part of the midfield battery from the interchange, while interceptmarking defender Rhett Montgomerie earned a place in the back pocket.

South Adelaide had one representative, rebounding defender Joey Haines, while Port Adelaide and wooden spooner West Adelaide were the only clubs without a player in the star-studded line-up.

There are 11 debutants in the side – Wright, Young, Ramsey, Will Combe, Boyd, Rokahr, Heard, Hosie, Bailey, Montgomerie and Page. Sturt skipper Battersby is the most capped player in the side, being picked for the fifth time, while Snook, Haines and Schiller were named for the fourth time.

PRELIMINARY FINAL PREVIEW

delaide and Norwood put in the hard work, played consistent footy and went on winning runs this season with their eyes on the prize of the finals double-chance.

These sides earned it and it's pretty clear why they craved it because they now have both used their extra 'life'. So it all starts again. And now it's do-or-die.

That all means what's happened in the past two weeks is nothing but history. The Crows crunched the Redlegs by 55 points in the qualifying final a fortnight back but it already seems like a lifetime ago. Because, since then, Norwood has reminded everyone why it was being touted as a flag favourite a few weeks back, bouncing back by bouncing Glenelg out of the premiership race with an impressive 28-point first semi-final win. And then the Crows were brought back to earth with a thump as North emphasised just what an even competition this is with a 10-point second semi-final win.

Norwood coach Jade Rawlings was steadfast after his side's loss to the Crows. "Belief has been established over a long period of time and it doesn't get taken away with one loss," he said. "I trust our group." His belief was well founded,

the Redlegs emphatically avoiding being bundled out in straight sets in successive years with a stirring four-quarter performance. He was delighted his men had returned to the "Norwood way". It's no great secret what that is.

The Redlegs stood out for their tough, contested footy, winning clearances, tackling ferociously and defending fervently across the ground as they conceded a league low 61 points per game over the minor round.

The Crows have been the highestscoring side in the league, averaging 94 points per game, but their sensational effort in slamming on 18.9 (117) in the qualifying final was a surprise because the most the Redlegs had previously conceded was 83 points against the Eagles way back in Round 2.

Against the Crows, ball magnet Nik Rokahr had returned from an ankle injury and captain Matt Nunn and superstar Matt Panos were back after long absences through injury. How good were those three as Norwood kept Glenelg to just 7.9 (51) in the first semi-final? Is there anyone you would rather with the ball in his hands anywhere within 50 metres of goal than Jack Oatey Medallist Panos? He bagged three crucial goals to bury the Bays.

Norwood won its minor round clashes against the Crows at The Parade by five and 12 points but no-one will think Adelaide can't win the flag, even after last week's loss to North

Coach Michael Godden said his men learned plenty from a hugely-competitive hit-out as the finals series stepped up another level. "I loved our contest ... I'm proud of that," he said of the way his side kept fighting hard.

Godden knows all about the pleasure and pain of preliminary finals. In his nine seasons as Eagles boss he coached in four of them, feeling the emptiness of defeat three times, including the controversial '19-man' clash against North in 2018.

In his first year in charge in 2010 the Eags were pipped by five points by Norwood. The following year showed just how long the two weeks between the qualifying final and preliminary final can be as his side again tangled with Norwood.

The Legs thumped the Eagles by 61 points in the qualifying final but Godden's men turned that around to beat Norwood by 44 points in the preliminary final. They then overcame Central in the grand final to win a famous flag, making the most of their extra 'life'.



KIERAN STRACHAN

The 202cm tall has been a giant of the SANFL this year, continually sparking the Crows with his impressive ruckwork, leading the league's ranking points with an imposing 112.5 per game. He averages a staggering 35 hit-outs a game and also picks up 17 disposals and six marks. But, on hit-outs, he's marginally behind preliminary final opponent Harry Boyd, who is averaging 36 per game. In Adelaide's convincing qualifying final win, however, Strachan held the edge with 43 hit-outs and 17 touches, to Boyd's 33 hit-outs and 16 disposals. If he can be even slightly on top again today, it will be a huge plus for the Crows.

He's never not in a game but after Strachan had an impressive qualifying final against him, Boyd came out all guns blazing in the knockout semi-final against Glenelg. Boyd, who finished sixth in the Magarey Medal but so easily could have ranked higher, was an unstoppable force against the Bays, winning 46 hit-outs and seven clearances, while chipping in with a key third-quarter goal after a huge pack mark. Boyd is not only the player who has won most hit-outs this year – 721 of them – he also has earned most clearances (seven per game). He and close mate Nik Rokahr, both recruited from Shepparton, form a matchwinning team within a team.



BILLY FRAMPTON

His strong intercept marking has played a crucial role in the Crows' SANFL resurgence this season as he has stepped up as a key defender. Even as the Roosters kept coming in their barnstorming second semi-final win last week, Frampton kept bobbing up in the right spots and marking strongly against the flow. The 200cm, 90kg utility had another powerful game against the odds against Port in Round 19, when he had 31 kicks and snared 14 marks. He is averaging 21 disposals, eight marks and eight rebound-50s in his 14 games this season, continually setting up attacks from down back.



NIK ROKAHR

The hard-at-it midfielder had such an impressive season he could so easily have been running onto Adelaide Oval today as Magarey Medallist. Rokahr missed the Redlegs' final minor round clash against West with an ankle injury and finished just one vote short of North Adelaide winner Aaron Young. In 19 games this season he has racked up 529 possessions to be just one behind Rooster Harrison Wigg for most in the league. As if picking up 28 touches a game isn't enough, he's using the ball with 94 per cent efficiency. Rokahr averages five clearances and five tackles to be an integral part of the Legs' renowned pressure game.

MAGAREY MEDAL THRILLER

North Adelaide midfielder Aaron Young on Monday night won a thrilling Magarev Medal count at Adelaide Oval, becoming the 18th Rooster to win SANFL's fairest and most brilliant individual award.

The dynamic on-baller polled 23 votes to edge out Norwood midfielder Nik Rokahr by one, while Sturt half-back Casey Voss and the Eagles' Riley Knight finished third on 21.

And the drama went right through to the last votes called out on the night – from Sturt's Round 19 win against North at Unley. Voss, who won the Fos Williams Medal as SA's best in its interstate win against WA in Perth in May, was impressive in the Blues' 22-point win against the Roosters and would have been joint winner with two votes or pipped Young with the three. But Sturt skipper James Battersby, who again had a top-10 finish, polled two votes and Tom Lewis snared the three for his only votes of the night.

"It was a bit nerve wracking those last two rounds," said Young, who took the lead after polling two

votes against Glenelg in Round 17 and didn't add any after that.

Rokahr and Knight had reason to rue their bad luck. Rokahr missed the Redlegs' final round match against West Adelaide with an ankle injury. Knight, winner of the Bob Shearman Medal for the SANFL's outstanding player as voted by the coaches, limped off at quarter-time of the Eagles' last game against South Adelaide with a strained hamstring. He had made a sizzling start to the Noarlunga clash, the leading disposal winner at the time with 11.

"It's an incredible feeling... it's a great honour," said Young, who had been pleased with his season but wasn't expecting to win because of competition for votes from his own team-mates.

"As a team we've been really strong all year – we haven't relied on one player," he said.

"Harrison Wigg has had his best year of footy I've seen and Campbell Combe again was massive for us. I thought we might just take a few votes off each other and leave one of the other guys who have had a great year like Rilev Knight ot Nik Rokahr or Casey Voss, who came home late... I thought they might have been a big chance."

But Young, who starred in North's hard-fought second semifinal win against Adelaide last week with 30 disposals and two goals to lead the Roosters into the grand final, was definitely a fitting winner.

The former Port Adelaide and Gold Coast AFL player polled in nine games, snaring six first preferences, two seconds and one third, having averaged an eyecatching 27 disposals, five marks and five clearances for the minor round while kicking 21 goals.

Glenelg's desperate in-andunder midfielder Matthew Snook. runner-up in the previous two seasons, continued to be so near. yet so far in fifth place on 18 votes, while Norwood ruckman Harry Boyd, the dominant big man in the league, polled 17.

LOVE FOR SANFL

e has won an AFL premiership but Kane Cornes says his heart lies with the SANFL.

"I grew up loving the SANFL, I owe some of my best memories to that competition," he said.

The youngest son of Glenelg champion and dual premiership coach Graham Cornes, Kane vividly remembers following his dad into the Tiger changerooms and mixing with "legendary players I admired so much".

He would stroll the short distance from his Yuill Street, Glenelg, home to the Bay oval to watch training sessions and on match days would park himself in the Tigers cheer squad and follow star full forward John Fidge "from goalsquare to goalsquare". "Whichever end 'Fidgey' was stationed at, I'd be there," he said.

Cornes would soon don the blackand-gold guernsey in games, starting with the under-12s, and made his league debut against the Eagles in 2000. Several months later, Cornes joined older brother, Chad, at AFL club Port Adelaide and he carved out a stellar career, becoming the Power's first 300game player and winning four club champion awards.

Now 39, his achievements have earned him a spot in the SA Football Hall of Fame. "To join dad and Chad in the Hall of Fame is pretty special," Cornes said. "All I wanted to do when I was growing up was to be like dad and then my brother



when he was coming through."

MATTHEW Pavlich grew up in the Eagles nest hoping to play at least one game for the SANFL club that meant so much to his family. His dad, Steve, represented West Torrens 125 times from 1969-77, while uncles Mark (121 games from 1974-84) and Greg (one game in 1986) also played for Torrens.

"All I wanted to do was to follow in my dad and uncles' footsteps and play a game for the Eagles, that was my dream," Matthew said. "My dad and uncles were the people I idolised and looked up to most and, being so close to it (SANFL football) because of their involvement, I could see and feel what it would be like, that it was within reach for me."

Making his SANFL league debut for the new Eagles in 1999, the powerfully-built, 192cm Pavlich made an immediate impact by playing 21 games in his rookie season. In a massive sliding doors moment, SA AFL clubs Adelaide and Port Adelaide missed a golden opportunity to secure Pavlich in 1998 under a rule where each club could draft one 17-year-old. It was a decision the clubs were left to

rue, with Pavlich picked at No. 4 at the 2000 national draft by Fremantle and going on to become the greatest player in the Dockers' history, playing 363 games and kicking 700 goals.

DARREN Wilson estimates he ran about 8000km in his 404 AFL games as a boundary umpire. Henley Beach-born Wilson holds the record for most AFL grand finals officiated by a boundary umpire, with 12.

BRUCE Schultz was a goalkicking machine. He only played 124 games for Norwood but kicked an extraordinary 669 goals at the remarkable average of 5.4 a game.

"The Schultz name is synonymous with Norwood," said Redlegs chief executive James Fantasia. "He is held in such high regard we're going to name the southern end of Norwood Oval the 'Bruce Schultz End', opposite the 'Roger Woodcock End'."

Schultz became the first Norwood player to reach the magical 100-goal mark in 1941 but suffered a serious knee injury in the match he achieved the feat, ending his career at the peak of his powers. He died in 1980, aged 66.

STAT GHAT: PRELIMINARY FINAL

ere we go again. This clash is a repeat match-up from a fortnight ago, when Adelaide and Norwood met in the qualifying final. The Crows claimed a resounding 55-point win in that one after the first finals meeting between these sides also was an Adelaide victory, in the 2019 first semi.

While the Redlegs are hoping for third time lucky in a final against Adelaide, the Crows are looking for the same in a preliminary final, after losing to Sturt in 2016 and Glenelg in '19.

The Redlegs are playing in their 31st preliminary final, matching Port's record number of appearances, while a victory would give it equal most wins with the Magpies (16). While Norwood has been a regular finals team over the past decade, its most recent preliminary final was in 2011, a 44-point loss against the Eagles, after beating the same side in the corresponding game 12 months earlier, by five points. Norwood fans won't be keen to remember their last preliminary final because their meagre 3.5 against the Eagles is the lowest score in these games. And the Legs had held the record before that with just 4.7 against Glenelg in 1981.

Smarting from losing the second semi to Glenelg in 1990 – the year it had failed in its controversial bid to join the AFL – Port Adelaide rebounded to kick a record preliminary final score of 28.14 to North's 14.7 and followed up by winning the grand final. Two other teams have kicked 25 goals in a preliminary final – in consecutive seasons. The Roosters' 25.18 beat Sturt 9.21 in 1973 and the Tigers' 25.15 was too good for Port's 17.11 in '74.

North Adelaide's 93-point smashing of Sturt in 1973 is the biggest margin, while Port had a couple of cracks at the record in the 1990s, beating the Roosters by 91 points in '90 and Central by 90 points in '94.

Teams have qualified for the premiership decider with a preliminary final victory by less than a goal 11 times, most recently in 2018 when North beat the Eagles by five points in the dramatic '19th man' clash. Only once has the penultimate game been decided by a single point, in 1982 when the Tigers triumphed over Port. Of

the 11 close clashes, Norwood has featured in seven, for four victories, it's most recent in 2010 against the Eagles.

Of the 88 preliminary final winners, only 33 have gone on to win a premiership but over the past decade they have had a surprising amount of success. A record six in a row from 2015 won the flag, with the Eagles bucking the trend last season.

The only club with a significant winning record in preliminary finals is Glenelg, with 15 victories from 21 games.

Glenelg kept its Under-18 Torrens University Cup campaign alive with a nail-biting two-point win against gallant Sturt in the first semi-final at ACH Group Stadium.

The Double Blues looked set for victory when star forward Chad Reschke's fifth goal gave them a seven-point lead with less than 10 minutes to play. But the Bays' Ethan Murdock hit back two minutes later with his second goal, trimming the margin to just one point in the 18th minute. Three consecutive behinds to the Tigers proved the difference in an incredibly even contest, in which Sturt led by as much as 14 points when Finn Wakelin goaled in the seventh minute of the final term.

as his side's best performer while Reschke continued to fight hard for the Blues with his five goals coming from seven kicks and seven marks. Ollie Reilly, Will Torode and Nick Sadler were also prominent.



TORRENS UNIVERSITY U16 WRAP

A seven-goal masterclass from Woodville-West Torrens forward Tyler Welsh catapulted the Eagles to a 56-point win against North Adelaide in the Under-16 Torrens University Cup first semi-final at The Parade.

The son of former Crow Scott Welsh, Tyler Welsh's monster performance, which also included 18 disposals and 11 marks, helped his side overcome a nine-point deficit at quarter-time. Promising Eagles ruck Tom Luck got things moving in the centre square while collecting 15 disposals, four marks, five tackles and 30 hit-outs, while Kade Herbert and Lachlan Lucas benefited from Luck's service by collecting 22 disposals each. North Adelaide's Tom Tasker, son of former Rooster Sean Tasker, led the way for his side with 28 disposals and seven marks.

Glenelg booked a berth in the under-16 premiership decider by holding off South Adelaide by six points in the second semi-final at ACH Group Stadium.

A goal to South's Jay Chapman in the 14th minute of the final quarter had the Panthers within two points before Glenelg's William Freckleton replied two minutes later to stretch his side's advantage back out to eight. Star South on-baller Phoenix Hargrave kicked the final two behinds of the game which left his team short, ahead of this Saturday's preliminary final against

OUR FOOTY, OUR WERMAGE

Our Footy, Our People, Our Stories, 145 Years of the SANFL is an exhibition that has the crowds flocking to the State Library. And one of the highlights of a must visit for footy fans is a 60-page souvenir booklet that captures the essence of SA's greatest sport. In it, renowned broadcaster, history buff and SANFL lover Keith Conlon enjoys some reminiscing.

ingoes in the north Park Lands? Really? On a time-travel tour of our early football heritage spots, we will get a picture of why the SANFL story is also all about our community's memories, going back all the way to 1860. In the Globe Hotel (long gone from Rundle Street) was the room where it happened. An advertisement had invited gentlemen who wanted to play Australian football, and so the Adelaide Football Club was born. Where is their historic and holy turf? It's probably about where the Adelaide University Oval sits today in the Park Lands.

We can also still visit the site of the Port Adelaide club's historic first practice match in 1870, located between Captain Hart's early Victorian Glanville Hall (now a function centre) and the Port River. Drop in for a round on the par-three course right on the spot.

What about those Dingoes? That was the nickname for Medindie Football Club, with their playing field in the north-east corner of the Park Lands. A sign there explains they were the beginnings of the North Adelaide Football Club.

Going back to the 1870s, we surely need a plaque for that sporting history hotspot, the Prince Alfred Hotel, absorbed in the 1950s into the Adelaide Town Hall. The South Australian Cricket Association was formed there in 1871. Then came the great moment on 30 April 1877 when the South Australian Football Association came into being at another meeting at the pub. There, South Adelaide president and future Premier, Charles Cameron Kingston, won the debate over which rules would prevail. He successfully advocated for the 'Victorian rules'... thereby saving SA from becoming a rugby state!

Adelaide Oval is predictably at the heart of SA's heritage and history, and that includes a bag of historic moments in Australian football. Until the arrival of AFLW, it held the record for a crowd at a women's

football game in 1929, when two sides played before 41,000 people.

While many of today's generation saw their team win a grand final at Football Park, it's worth noting only four decades of SANFL premiership deciders were played there. More than twice that number drew huge crowds to Adelaide Oval. Only one grand final was played elsewhere. Why? A stoush between SAFA and SACA. Sound familiar?

Jubilee Oval hosted the 1904 spectacle. Created in 1895, the ground was in what is now part of the University of Adelaide campus closest to Botanic Park. As World War I was grinding on in 1918, it claimed a place in the history of women's football. A crowd of about 11,000 watched a game during a patriotic fundraising carnival, as the Moore's department store girls took on their rivals from Marshalls (the forerunner of Myers).

Among the myriad images from the SANFL History Centre collection in the 2022 exhibition at the State Library, it is the crowd pictures that perhaps tell the football heritage story best of all. Through 145 years of passionate barracking across great changes from fashion to the fate of our economy, football has been much more than a game. Our love of the game has helped us bind together and appreciate our past.



TRIO'S MEDAL GLORY

Prolific Glenelg midfielder Kyle Crompton had his consistency rewarded by winning the Reserves Magarey Medal. Polling 23 votes, Crompton went one better this year after placing second behind West's Ed Allan in 2021. The Bloods' Charlie Allan claimed 21 votes, while North's Matthew Longbottom was third on 18. Glenelg captain Ben Ridgway has become the second successive Tigers skipper to win the McCallum Tomkins Medal for under-18s after Hugh Stagg saluted in 2021. Ridgway polled 17 votes to edge powerful Sturt forward Chad Reschke and North midfielder Billy Dowling on 15. South Adelaide speedster Benny Barrett held on to win the inaugural SANFL Under-16 Best and Fairest Medal with 24 votes. A member of the victorious Torrens University SA U16 side, Barrett edged out team-mate Phoenix Hargrave and Glenelg's Charlie McAuliffe on 23.
