The 2017 season was a roller coaster with some high moments, especially the early season form that saw us have some excellent wins at Gliderol Stadium and the very evident improvement in the team's performance. In contrast we had some disappointing results when playing away from home and the unacceptable capitulation in the last three rounds of the minor round that resulted in us missing the finals, which was absolutely a missed opportunity.

This disappointing finish and lack of consistency resulted in the Football Committee and Board reviewing all aspects of the season to ensure we leave no stone unturned to rectify the situation and create an environment that is hungry for success and has the required resources, systems and processes in place to drive consistent winning performances.

We were guite advanced in implementing the recommended changes with the senior coach Matt Lokan when the Port Adelaide Football Club offered him a position as an assistant coach in early November, the day before our pre-season started. We were extremely disappointed in the manner Port Adelaide managed this situation waiting until November to make the appointment, showing an absolute lack of respect on the impact this has on an SANFL Club. Whilst disappointed, as a Club we understand Matt's decision to further his career at an AFL Club and thank him for his effort during his time at GFC and wish Matt, Bec and their family all the best in the future.

Immediately we embarked on an intense search for a replacement and interviewed some outstanding candidates over the following weeks. However, there was one standout in-regards to his football experience, knowledge and maturity, that possessed the characteristics we believe were necessary to get the best out of our senior playing group and clearly communicate the brand of football that will be implemented across all grades within the club. That was Mark Stone, who we appointed as senior coach in early December, successfully luring him over from Western Australia after having five years with Fremantle under Ross Lyon and prior to that ten years split between Sydney and West Coast.

Mark certainly had to hit the ground running and has been very impressive already in what he has implemented and is working on with the playing group. I would like to welcome Mark, his partner Kerry and their children Lila and Lenny to the Glenelg Football Club and look forward to working hard with Mark to ultimately achieve the highest level of success at the Bay again.

Mark's positive appointment has been backed up with some excellent recruiting from the Football Department, signing quality players such as Jessie White, Luke Reynolds, Marlon Motlop and Nick Amato to name a few. This fresh injection of talent into the team combined with the continued development and improvement of our current list under the direction of an experienced and extremely structured coaching group provides us with great optimism that we will achieve our expectation of competing in the major round

Our long time Junior Development Manager Brenton Hole left his position late in the season. I would like to thank Brenton for his loyalty and commitment to the club over his ten years in the role and congratulate him on not only what he achieved with our underage success at Glenelg, but also his involvement with numerous juniors from our zone that have gone on to be drafted and forged successful AFL careers. I hope you enjoy spending a bit more time on the golf course Brenton.

We had a very positive result financially for the 2017 year ending 31 October, reporting a consolidated profit of \$681,739 compared to \$14.278 in 2016. Whilst this is an excellent result for the Club it must

be highlighted that this profit is made up of some extraordinary items such as a payroll tax refund and the SANFL land distribution from the sale of AAMI stadium. We have provided a financial executive summary in the annual report that succinctly details our current financial position for you, rather than me expanding on it here.

The vast majority of this cash profit was used to reduce our liabilities, predominately the long term debt to the ANZ by \$209,833 and the council \$274,666 and reduce our creditor liabilities by \$362,406.

It is an outstanding achievement to reduce our liabilities throughout the year by \$846,905, which has allowed us to manage our creditors more strategically and not reactively. However, our cash in bank position remains very challenging and without the ongoing support of the City of Holdfast Bay with the interest relief on our loan and the reduction they provided on our lease, we would be in an extremely precarious position. I must acknowledge and thank the City of Holdfast Bay for their ongoing support and reinforce the positive impact that this is having on the Glenelg Football Club and our local community.

In this challenging hospitality climate, especially the uncertainty around gaming and the impact of the changing SANFL environment, we must continue to reinvent ourselves as an organisation and look at strategies that will allow us to survive in the future. In January 2018 we welcomed the ACH group into the upstairs venue area to provide their treatment rooms and exercise class services. This will provide a consistent and guaranteed rental income for the Club. The ACH fit out is outstanding and we will be working hard to attract their clients into other areas of our facility which will ultimately help grow our business. We continue to strive to provide an excellent value for money offering in our bar and bistro area and have seen some excellent improvements and results.

The redevelopment of the Sparks grandstand to grass terraces covered by sails, will provide an excellent area for families to watch the football from in 2018. This is scheduled to be finished before our first home game and continues the realisation of our goal to provide the best facilities for our players and our members.

I would like to congratulate Glenn Elliott and his team on the commitment and passion they have shown, and the improvements they have made over the last twelve months. It is an exciting time ahead both on and off the field and they remain focused on continual improvement and striving for success in all areas of club.

A list of acknowledgements is printed later in the report thanking everyone who has been involved last season, so I will not repeat that. However, I must thank my fellow board members for the support they have provided me and their hard work across the year. To Gliderol our naming rights and major sponsor and all our sponsors at every level thankyou for your continued association with the Glenela Football Club.

Thankyou to all the volunteers, members, past players and supporters for remaining loyal to the Tigers and we will be doing everything in our power to ensure 2018 will be a year to enjoy and remember

A mountain of work has been done over the previous two to three years, by many people, across all areas of the club to build a strong foundation for the Glenelg Football Club to build from. 2018 is the year the building must take shape, with the people we have in place and the resources at our disposal there is no excuse.

Executive Summary for the 31 October 2017 Financial Statements

Glenelg Footballers' Club (Venue)

- The Net Profit for the year ended 31 October 2017 was \$341,318 compared to the Net Profit of \$250,495 reported for the year ended 31 October 2016 which represents a 36% increase in Net Profit.
- Whilst this appears to be a significant improvement there are two factors that need to be taken into account:
- We received \$177,221 from our insurance company for a Business Interruption Claim The consequent closure of the Function Centre will be felt by the Club, however we have already restructured to replace this lost income stream. We have secured ACH for a 10 -year sublease utilising 50 % of the first-floor space. Sourcing new, profitable and reliable revenue streams remains a priority.
- The support of the City of the Holdfast Bay to provide us with interest free facilities for 2 years and the waiving of the outstanding interest charges resulted in a saving of \$188,685 for the Club. Without the continued support of the Council the long term sustainability of the Club would be jeopardised.
- After adding back depreciation of \$69,131 the Cash Net Profit was \$410,449 for the year ended 31
 October 2017.
- Bar Sales & Kitchen Sales for the 12 months were down from the previous year by \$569,388 or 24%. However, this decrease is largely attributable to the reduction in sales from the closure of the Function Centre which contributed \$541,124 of this reduction. It is important to note that Function Centre income was subject to high service costs and general overheads.
- Whist we have been able to increase bistro food sales due to the high quality of our food unfortunately this was eroded by the reduction in bar & bistro beverage sales of \$104,573. Unfortunately this seems to be an industry norm at the moment given drink driving, liquor costs, entertaining at home etc.
- The other area of concern is the ongoing decline of Gaming Revenue which decreased by \$56,712 from the previous year. Whilst we are aware of the social impacts of gaming on the Community this reduction and the uncertainty of the impact that Nick Xenophon's party will have at the State Election is a major concern for the survival of our Club and other Clubs as a whole.
- We continue to review and ensure we have a tight rein on our expenditure with wages being the largest expense being reduced by \$178,357.

Executive Summary for the 31 October 2017 Financial Statements

Glenelg Football Club (Football)

- The Net Profit for the year ended 31 October 2017 was \$340,421 compared to the Net Loss of (\$236,617) reported for the year ended 31 October 2016.
- The following extraordinary items were included in the 31 October 2017 Net Profit amount:
- Payroll Tax Refund \$163,025
- SANFL Land Divestment Fund \$412,000
- After adjusting for the above extraordinary items the Net Loss was \$234,604 for the year ended 31 October 2017 compared to the adjusted Net Loss of \$324,217 for the year ended 31 October 2016 an improvement of \$89,613 or 27%.
- After adding back depreciation of \$60,347 to the Net Profit of \$340,421 the Cash Net Profit was \$400,768 for the year ended 31 October 2017.
- The improvement in the above result was largely attributable to the ongoing review and reduction in our expenditure. The Football Club reduced its total expenditure from \$1,903,545 in 2016 to \$1,736,895 in 2017 being a reduction of \$166,650.
- It needs to be noted that income streams in the Club from memberships & sponsorships continue
 to be difficult to maintain and are reliant on the direction of the SANFL and identifying where the
 SANFL sit in the current football landscape.

Consolidated:

- Consolidated Net Profit for the year ended 31 October 2017 was \$681,739 compared to \$14,278 for the year ended 31 October 2016.
- When adding back the depreciation for the combined Venue and Football Club of \$129,478 for 2017 and \$146,138 for 2016 the Consolidated Net Cash Profit was \$811,217 for 2017 and \$160,416 for 2016.
- After adjusting for the extraordinary items of the SANFL Land Distribution and Payroll Tax Refund the Adjusted Net Cash Profit was \$236,192 for 2017 compared to \$72,416 for 2016. Please refer to below calculations.

Please note the Net Cash Profit does not represent the amount that is reflected in our bank accounts as the Net Cash Profit is simply the difference between Revenue and Expenditure and does not take into account the reduction in liabilities or the increase in assets. The Net Cash Profit has been used to reduce various liabilities predominantly the long term debt to the ANZ by \$209,833 and the Council debt by \$274,666 a combined reduction of \$484,499. The balance of Net Cash Profit was used to reduce our Creditor Liabilities by \$362,406 to ensure that we have improved our Working Capital position to enable us to continue to trade.

· Unfortunately, whilst we work on retiring debt we do not have any surplus cash to invest back into the Club to improve and freshen up our facilities. We must do so to compete with Hotels who continue to invest large amounts on capital improvements.

FROM ZERO TO HERO

How dual club champion Matthew Snook turned his career around

MATTHEW Snook was so disillusioned with football in 2014 he thought about walking away from the game.

In and out of the Glenelg side after debuting in 2011, the classy, left-footed midfielder was contemplating taking a year off and then joining a rival SANFL club.

"When 'Stevo' (Nick Stevens) was coaching (in 2014) I was pretty bored with football because halfway through the season I wasn't playing league and had been starved of opportunities," Snook said.

"I was thinking of giving it away for a year and then changing clubs.

"But I ended up sticking it out, had a decent run in the league side and haven't looked back since, which is crazy when you think about the position I was in."

Fast-forward three seasons and Snook has not only consolidated his spot in the Glenelg team but joined an illustrious group of 22 men to have won multiple league club champion awards for the Tigers.

His runaway win in 2017 - with 150 votes he finished a whopping 47 ahead of runner-up Jonty Scharenberg (103) - followed his breakthrough triumph in 2015.

"It's an absolute honour to win the award again," Snook said.

"The first one probably didn't sink in that much but to win a second one is really special.

"Three or four years ago I was in a position where I was just happy to get a game and to now be a twotime best and fairest winner, it's special but also is something that probably won't sink in until I've finished my career.

"Originally I was just happy to represent Glenelg at league level and hadn't even dreamed of winning two best-and-fairests."

Snook's career turning point came in the second half of former Port Adelaide and Carlton AFL star Stevens' one and only year as Glenelg coach.

Given a chance to consolidate a spot in the side

mid-season. he grasped his long-awaited opportunity with both hands, performing so well that he finished equal-second in the best-and-fairest count with Aaron Joseph behind joint winners Andrew Bradley and Craig Pitt.

"Being given an extended chance and doing okay was good for my confidence, I started to believe in myself more and away I went," Snook said.

A dual Tigers under-18 premiership player, Snook took his game to the next level under new coach Matthew Lokan the following season to win his first club champion award and after a modest 2016 campaign he raised the bar again last season.

"I guess the big thing for me last year was my consistency," the 25-year-old said.

"I was able to narrow the gap between my good and bad games which is what good players are able to do, so that was pleasing."

A ball magnet and contested ball and clearance king, Snook has established himself as one of the SANFL's premier players

But he believes he can get better - as a player and

"I want to improve my outside game, my running and ability to be more attacking and kick more goals," said Snook, who combines football with his full-time job as a carpenter.

"I've had a chat to the new coach (Mark Stone) about that and we'll work out a strategy so that I can hopefully become a better all-round player."

A dual Tigers under-18 premiership player, Snook is craving more team success.

He has played only one league final - an elimination final loss to South Adelaide in 2011 - and was shattered that the team fell out of the top five following a final-round loss to West Adelaide last season.

"Our end to the season wasn't good and to miss out on the finals after being in a good position took me a while to get over," Snook said.

"We've recruited pretty well and have a strong core of players who have been together for quite a while so we think we can be very competitive in 2018.


"The club hasn't won a (league) flag since 1986 and that's what's driving me. To win something with my teammates and break the drought for our supporters would be pretty special."

Glenelg's penchant for producing draftees continues to go from strength-to-strength with the Tigers now boasting more players on an AFL list than any Two south-east products own a special place in SANFL rival.

After having Darcy Fogarty, Dom Barry and Jack- AFL midfielders. son Edwards selected at the 2017 AFL National and Rookie Drafts by the two South Australian clubs, the Bays now have a total of 19 plying their trade at elite level.

Led by genuine stars Bryce Gibbs – who has moved from Carlton to play for the Crows in 2018 and Dockers midfield jet Lachie Neale, the Tigers' crop also includes seasoned campaigners in Jack Redden (West Coast) and Jordan Murdoch (Geelong).

Nine of the group have originated from Glenelg's talent-rich Country Zone in the south-east of SA, with the club's four talent academy hubs continuing to bear fruit.

Retired Glenelg Talent Manager Brenton Hole said having the hubs in Mount Gambier, Naracoorte, Bordertown and Millicent had played a major role in registering the impressive draft numbers.

"They are pretty strong and compelling numbers," said Hole, who worked at Brighton Road for a decade from 2007 to 2017.

"They have been really positive to the kids who got somewhere (AFL list) but also to the kids who went back to their local clubs.

"It inspired them to have a go as they started to see some kids they were in an Academy with, suddenly on an AFL list."

The steady nature of personnel heading up the south-east academies has also had a major influence, according to Hole.

"We've had a couple of long-term coaches involved – particularly Andrew Nitschke at Millicent and Jamie Weatherald at Bordertown." Hole said.

"They have been fantastic with their work and support for the club - it's just been great for developing the talented players in the area."

"Jack Redden, from Keith, was one of the early ones when I arrived which I remember fondly," Hole said of Redden, who is now at West Coast after being drafted by Brisbane in 2008.

"Jack put his head down and had a crack and his performances for our Under-19 premiership team ensured he went from someone who didn't look like he would get drafted to someone Brisbane got really excited about.

"He also had some trauma that year too as one of his mates was killed after being hit by a train in Keith so it was a terrible experience for the family but to see Jack get there was a great thing for

Fremantle's reliable ball magnet Lachie Neale is the other player Hole recalls with a grin, with the pint-sized on-baller from Kybybolite now considered one of the Dockers' prime movers in the mid-

"I remember talking to one of our Under-15 coaches when Lachie first came up to school as

a 14-year-old at St Peter's College," Hole said of Neale, who played in Glenelg's last League final in 2011 as an 18-year-old.

"The coach rang me straight away to say that kid will make it as a footballer, as I just saw him walking down Port Road on the footpath bouncing a footy. Kids just don't do that anymore. But that's what Lachie Neale was like, he just did everything in his power to get better."

Tigerland has also proved to be a second-chance saloon for mature-age indigenous pair Willie Rioli (West Coast) and Barry, who was thrown a lifeline by Port Adelaide after a consistent season in 2017 netted 16 goals from 18 games.

But with the draft success does come the natural frustration for Glenelg diehards, who can only help fantasise about how strong the Bays would be if the 19 players were available to don the gold sash in 2018.

"It is something to be proud about but it does make it tough on the other hand," said Hole, who also maintains a close relationship with Geelong's Lincoln McCarthy, who started in Bordertown.

"You've got to hope that one day if their AFL career does finish before they are ready to retire that they will come back and play for Glenelg.

"But there's so many kids that have come through our pathway who have gone on to become better people after fighting their way through the selection process and trying to get there.

"They began to learn about what life is all about and that for me was the most important part, seeing the kids develop.

"Whether they made it to the AFL or not, it was satisfying just to see them achieve their individual goals."

- Q / What positions have you held within the club? Property Steward for the seniors side, it was by chance that a friend that I hadn't seen for a while got on the same bus to the city that I had caught and he asked if I would like to be involved with the Club, that friend was and still is Kerry Donovan, thank you Kerry.
- Q / What do you enjoy most about being a GFC Volunteer? Simply put, the involvement and being able to spend time with quality people and seeing young players mature and achieve their goals in becoming senior players not only at Glenelg, but going on to play at an AFL club.

I am chairman of the club's new history committee, which has nine other members (and they're all rippers) – Laurie Rosewarne, Tony Symonds, Andrew Capel, Zac Milbank, Mike Sexton, John Robinson, David Jenkins, Brad Shiell and Torrie Osborn.
- Q / What do you enjoy most about being a volunteer? The people. There have not only been many champion players at this club but countless champion people as well. Everyone at the club makes you feel welcome, makes you feel part of the team and appreciates what you do. Everyone always seems to have time for a chat. They are often fighting difficult odds but their passion for the task at hand never wavers as they all strive for the thing the club needs most – a flag.

HOME, SWEETER HOME

"The answer, my friend, is blowin' in the wind."

So wrote iconic American singer-songwriter Bob Dylan Friday against Port Adelaide. in 1962.

Back then, Glenelg Oval was state of the art, the newly-opened Edward Rix Stand and 25-year-old HY Sparks Stand standing proudly as the Tigers confidently faced the future in the days the SANFL dominated the State's it just wasn't up to it any more. sporting landscape.

By December 2016, the Bay had a very different feel. Earlier that year Glenelg had announced its doors might have to be closed as it faced \$3m debts. The Sparks Stand – with the players' changerooms, lockers, gym, meeting and medical rooms underneath - was decidedly dated. There had been talk about moving the weights room amid concerns about archaic facilities.

And then the wind blew.

A freak storm ripped the roof from the HY Sparks Stand, hurling sheets of metal out into the car park next to Brighton Rd. Could this be the last straw? The final si-

Not likely. Tigers president Nick Chigwidden and chief executive Glenn Elliott have initiated a spirited fightback that has brought about a bright new look to the ground and more positive vibes about a strong, long-term out-

The ill-wind that caused such grave damage to the rooms. Sparks Stand has sparked a chain reaction that has given Gliderol Stadium the facelift it so desperately required and Glenelg's players – men and women – and even the opposition top-class facilities in step with the times.

The opposition's changerooms were also under the stands, with their coaching box and timekeepers' room at the top of the stand. And the players' race or tunnel came from within it. There also was the recently installed Tigers Wall of Fame, which lists every Glenelg league player in order of appearance and is a substantial five metres by two-and-a-half metres.

Just how much needed to be done would have been enough to make your head spin. But first it had to be worked out how it could be done. "It was quite confronting," Elliott admits. "It brought everything to a standstill."

Instead of planning how to get the Tigers back in the finals, it was all about getting them on the park. Would PHOTO: Construction of the new changeroom facility

Glenelg actually be able to play its home games at the Bay in the 2017 season, just three months down the track? And the Tigers' first home game was scheduled for the opening night of the season, under lights on a

It had soon became clear there would be no new roof for the stand, which was built in 1937 and named after former Glenelg mayor Henry Yorke Sparks, who founded Glenelg Oval. It also had suffered some damage and

There would be enough room for fans in the larger Edward Rix Stand but where would the players go?

The players' gym was moved from the bowels of the old stand into part of the function centre facing the oval, a much better outlook for the players and obviously more enticing to potential recruits.

The function centre was built in 2002 and had become a heavy financial burden and would have required extensive renovations to be competitive anyway. The other section of the function centre has now been refurbished and is being rented by ACH Group, looking at health and fitness for the 50-plus, a new revenue stream greatly improving the club's bottom line.

The function centre also came to the rescue in finding a place for Glenelg's changerooms. Or at least the car park under it did. Elliott did himself out of a sheltered spot for his car but he thought the space under the centre could be enclosed and converted into his players'



There was plenty of football expertise used in the planning and building of the changerooms. Glenelg Hall of Fame goalkicking great Fred Phillis designed the new facility, while West Adelaide best and fairest Kaine Stevens and Bloods team-mate Dustin Head's carpentry business went to work on putting it together.

There was a very strong smell of fresh paint as the players saw their rooms for the first time on the day the season opened. It was a spectacular result that had seemed highly unlikely, just like the stunning 17-point win against Port that night.

The Bays had been preparing for women's footy with plans for changerooms in the old St John ambulance and Children and Family Health building behind the scoreboard. It was converted to accommodate visiting SANFL teams and Elliott believes the rooms "are arguably the best in the competition for that purpose".

The opposition coaches' box is now at the top of the Edwards Rix Stand, along with the timekeepers' room.

"Unbelievably, the final outcome was a fantastic result for the club, the players, and dare I say, City of Holdfast Bay Council, with the improved facilities, which are state of the art," said Elliott.

Like a successful football team, teamwork was critical, especially with such demanding deadlines. Elliott praised the supportive council, Elders, QBE Insurance

and the builders, Pattersons, for the close co-operation that has ensured the club hasn't missed a beat. The Wall of Fame fitted perfectly on the wall facing the entry to the Ray Curnow Foyer and fans – including opposition ones – are often found checking out the great and less-known names, recalling the good ol' days.

Over summer the HY Sparks Stand has gradually been demolished to create a sheltered area featuring shade sails that will be ready for the Tigers' first home game of 2018, in round two. History has been honoured by retaining a portion of the stand walls to become a retaining wall for the new viewing area.

The winds of change have come to the Bay – and things are getting better.




